	Schooner AB	Session D: Let the Buyer Beware: Telehealth Contract Risk Management Telehealth technology and services vendor and partner contracts are often a great mystery to care providers and vendors alike. A contract is meant to describe a "meeting of the minds" of its signatories, but complicated or unclear contract language can obscure the parties' intentions. This can create conflict, which can lead to unnecessary time and financial resources devoted to mitigation, termination, and litigation. This hassle and expense can often be avoided by ensuring a clearer understanding of the terms of these contracts from the start. The decision to purchase a product or service from a telehealth vendor is the start of a key business relationship with your organization, and transparency should be the foundation upon which that relationship is built. In this session, Attorney Rebecca E. Gwilt will draw from her experience negotiating technology contracts to discuss key provisions for parties on both sides of the transaction to examine before signing on the dotted line.
